High use of health services among Australians with disability

People with severe or profound disability rely up to 10 times as heavily on health services, such as general practitioners, as Australians without a disability, according to a report released by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW).

The report, *The use of health services among Australians with disability*, shows that the high use of health services among people with disability is linked to a high prevalence of multiple long-term health conditions, in particular the combination of mental and physical health conditions.

'The high use of services prevails even after taking into account the multiple health conditions, with or without mental health conditions,' said AIHW spokesperson Mr Sean Ackland. 'This suggests that the level of functional impairment, in addition to the presence of multiple health conditions, increases the likelihood of needing and seeking assistance from the health care system.'

The report shows that, in the 12 months before the data was collected, people with severe or profound disability were 3.5 times as likely to have consulted a specialist doctor, and 5 times as likely to have consulted both a specialist doctor and other health professionals as people without disability.

The report also shows that of all people with mental disorders aged 16–64 years, those with severe and profound disability were 2.5 times as likely as those without disability to access health services (including hospitals) for mental health problems, and twice as likely to consult health professionals (including GPs) for mental health problems.

Similarly, of all people with a combination of a mental disorder and any physical condition aged 16–64 years, those with severe or profound disability were around 3 times as likely to access health services (including hospitals), consult health professionals (including GPs), or consult mental health professionals, for mental health problems.

The AIHW is a major national agency set up by the Australian Government to provide reliable, regular and relevant information and statistics on Australia's health and welfare.

The use of health services among Australians with disability

This bulletin is the second in a series about health of people with disability. It examines the use of health services among Australians with disability based on national population health survey data.

Compared with people without disability, people aged 15–64 years with severe or profound disability were:

- 10 times more likely to have check-ups with general practitioners (GPs) at least once a month (29% versus 3%)

- 3.5 times more likely to consult specialist doctors in the 12 months before the survey period 2007–08 (56% versus 16%)
- 5 times more likely to consult both specialist doctors and other health professionals in the 12 months before the survey period 2007–08 (41% versus 8%).

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people with disability

Indigenous Australians have rates of ill-health and disability substantially higher than other Australians. Census 2006 data suggest that Indigenous people are 2-3 times more likely to need assistance with the core activities of daily living (self-care, communication and mobility) than non-Indigenous people.

Profile of Indigenous Australians with disability

- The employment rate among Indigenous Australians aged 15–64 years with disability (13%) is significantly lower than among Indigenous people without disability (51%).
- Reliance on Government pensions and allowances as the principal source of income among Indigenous people (aged 18–64 years) with severe or profound disability is similar to that for all Australians (of similar age and severity of disability).
- Indigenous Australians with severe or profound disability have very low rates of year 12 high school attainment (16%) compared with Indigenous Australians without disability (28%) in the same age range (18–64 years).
- On average 14% of Indigenous women and 9% of Indigenous men shoulder caring responsibilities.
- 30% of Indigenous Australians aged 18–64 years with the most severe levels of disability had wanted to pursue further study in the 12 months prior to survey and 13% were unable to do so because of caring or family reasons.
- Daily smoking is more common among Indigenous Australians with more severe disability (52%) than Indigenous Australians without disability or long-term health conditions (42%) in the 18–64 years age group.

Services and support

- There are 12,068 Indigenous Australians aged 0–64 years who use specialist disability services in Australia. Indigenous service users comprise 5% of all service users.
- Case management (as part of community support) and open employment support are the most commonly used service types among Indigenous Commonwealth State/Territory Disability Agreement-funded (CSTDA) service users.
- 46% of Indigenous Australians aged 18–64 years with severe or profound core activity limitations report problems accessing service providers.

About

On 10 May 2011, a range of measures reforming the NFP sector in Australia were announced in the 2011-12 Budget of the Australian Government, including the creation of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC). The ACNC will be an independent regulator and will:

- be advised by an Advisory Board chaired by Robert Fitzgerald AM
- report to Parliament through the Treasurer
- be staffed by around 90 officers, with potential for growth if additional functions are added
- be supported by the ATO in the provision of back-office services

The Government has provided \$53.6 million over four years for the establishment of the ACNC and related structural changes required to the ATO.

To support the introduction of the ACNC, an implementation taskforce was established from 1 July 2011. The ACNC Taskforce is a nine member taskforce headed by Susan Pascoe AM with members from the Treasury, ATO and PM&C. Additional support is being received for the activities of the taskforce from:

- ATO which is providing operational support – building the IT portal, separating the registration function from current operations and assisting with the development of a communications strategy.
- The Treasury, which is providing budget and administrative support and accommodation for the Taskforce.

The ACNC Taskforce will engage with the Not-for-Profit sector in an open and collaborative manner on key elements of the establishment and operation of the ACNC as the national regulator.

Treasury is responsible for policy and legislation with respect to regulation and taxation of the NFP sector including:

- Developing legislation for the ACNC.
- Developing legislation for a statutory definition of “charity”.
- Reviewing fundraising legislation and ‘Companies Limited by Guarantee’ (as it relates to charities).
- Implementing reforms to better target NFP tax concessions.
- Restating the ‘In Australia’ special conditions and implementing reforms relating to public ancillary funds

Commission calls for reform of federal discrimination laws

The Australian Human Rights Commission has lodged its submission with the Attorney-General's Department for the consolidation of discrimination laws project.

The project, part of the Australian Human Rights Framework, will see all existing discrimination laws, such as those on race, disability, sex and age and the Australian Human Rights Commission Act, streamlined into one national equality and discrimination law.

The Commission argues that despite the fact that existing federal discrimination laws have been successful to some extent, discrimination remains prevalent.

Accordingly, the Commission believes that in order to promote equality in the law, improvements are needed both in the substance of discrimination laws and associated mechanisms.

The Commission says that discrimination law can be made easier to understand, comply with, and enforce through such things as ensuring greater simplicity and more consistency. It also calls for measures to improve access to justice for people and organisations seeking to assert rights, and to increase certainty for people and organisations seeking to comply with their responsibilities.

Council of Australian Governments (COAG) reforms

At the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) meeting in February 2011 all governments committed to signing a National Health Reform Agreement (NHRA) with effect from 1 July 2011, which will supersede the April 2010 National Health and Hospitals Network Agreement. The NHRA and associated National Partnership Agreement on Transitioning Responsibilities for Aged Care and Disability Services provide for a split of responsibilities for aged care and disability programs at age 65, or at age 50 for Indigenous Australians.

The Commonwealth will assume full responsibility for aged care, including aged care services under the Home and Community Care Program, from 1 July 2012 and has committed to not substantially altering service delivery mechanisms before 1 July 2015. The NSW Government is working with the Commonwealth to ensure minimal disruption to clients and existing providers, and real improvements for clients and carers across the state. ADHC is committed to ongoing communication with the sector on matters arising from the reforms.

Ron Merkel QC wins the 2011 Human Rights Medal

The Honourable Ron Merkel QC has won the **2011 Human Rights Medal**. Mr Merkel was recognised for his advocacy, often on a pro bono basis, in some of the most significant human rights cases in Australia. He is widely recognised for as one of Australia's leading public and administrative law practitioners specialising in the areas of human rights, civil liberties, the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, migration law, equal opportunity and anti-discrimination law.

The **Young People's Human Rights Medal** was awarded to 19 year old **Tshibanda Gracia Ngoy** for her human rights work in the community. A caseworker for refugee families, radio co-host, tutor for international students, and youth motivational speaker, Tshibanda is also a member of the Illawarra Regional Advisory Council (IRAC), the NSW Multicultural Youth Network (MYN), and Strategic Community Assistance to Refugee Families (SCARF).

Awards were also presented to Swags for Homeless, Ten News journalists Matt Moran and Hugh Riminton for the Skype Scandal, and **Adele Horin for a series of articles uncovering human rights abuses in licensed boarding**

houses in NSW.

More than 450 people attended the annual event at the Sofitel Sydney.

Commission President Catherine Branson QC also delivered the Human Rights Day Oration and announced a major new community engagement initiative – Something in Common.

Realising an inclusive approach to families with a young person with a disability and challenging behaviour**, *Disability & Society*, 26(5): 629-642, United Nation's conventions exist to help facilitate and protect vulnerable people's human rights: including people with disabilities (Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, 2006) and children (Convention on the Rights of the Child, 1989). However, for some families where a family member has a disability, there may be inherent conflicts in meeting stand-alone human rights conventions. These conventions should work together to ensure that young people with disabilities and challenging behaviour and their parents and siblings all have equal rights to full participation in social, economic and civic life. Yet service system deficits mean that this is not always the case. This paper argues that governments need to provide a whole of family and community support approach to ensure the human rights of all family members are met. This is a transnational complex ethical, moral and human rights issue that needs to be debated and addressed.

The Supported Accommodation Innovation Fund (SAIF)

The Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs (FaHCSIA) is administering the Supported Accommodation Innovation Fund (SAIF). SAIF provides \$60 million in funding over three years to build up to 150 innovative, community-based supported accommodation and respite places for people with disability.

Projects could include renovations to existing homes, pooled resources to build contemporary accommodation services close to community and health services, or the modification of established buildings. A number of different types of organisations will be eligible to apply.

Applicants will need to be able to demonstrate that they have secured funding to meet ongoing support costs to sustain the supported accommodation either from a state or territory government or from alternative funding sources such as philanthropy. A single contact point for each state and territory is provided for applicants to seek advice on ongoing support funding.

FaHCSIA's preferred model of service delivery is for accommodation and support services to be separated (i.e. provided by two different organisations). This model aims to allow individuals to experience housing and support provided separately rather than by a single provider which may have been the only option previously available. Residential aged care in Australia 2009-10: a statistical overview

Residential aged care in Australia 2009-10 provides comprehensive statistical information on residential aged care facilities, their residents, admissions and separations, and residents' dependency levels. At 30 June 2010, there were nearly 183,000 residential aged care places, an increase of almost 3% compared with 30 June 2009. Over 83,500 permanent residents (52%) had a recorded diagnosis of dementia at 30 June 2010. The SDAC was also conducted in 2003 and this publication presents some comparisons with the 2003 survey. The 2009 SDAC was largely a repeat of the 2003 survey, with some additions to content in the areas of unmet demand for assistance, social inclusion, and labour force participation.

It will be of great relevance to worldwide countries as they work to promote and monitor equal employment opportunities for disabled persons. It provides information on current standards and definitions in the fields of employment and disability, as well as descriptions of good practices related to the compilation of statistics on the employment situation of people with disabilities, so that better data on this topic can be produced. It is directed to countries wishing to gather or improve such statistics in order to meet policy needs and it is an attempt to bring together all relevant information in this field. Its main objective is to inform users on current state of national methodologies for the compilation of statistics on the employment situation of people with disabilities; standards and definitions for the measurement of different sub-groups of the economically active population; concepts and methods for the measurement of disability; and useful sources and survey questions on disability.

Pathways in aged care: do people follow recommendations?

Eligibility for key aged care programs is assessed by Aged Care Assessment Teams (ACATs). These teams also make recommendations on the preferred long-term setting for receiving care; that is, in the person's home or in a residential care facility. Analysis shows that there was considerable variation in care pathways within recommendation group. Rates of transition into permanent residential care varied with the use of community care and residential respite care.
